SD 46 Numeracy Committee

- Was established 4 years ago in February 2016
- Main purpose is to support educators in our district to enhance overall student learning and achievement in mathematics
- This is based on the School District 46

Strategic Plan: 2019 – 2023 which states,

"Our students will be numerate. They will have the skills and tenacity to interpret and apply mathematical understandings in flexible, functional, and creative ways.

Goals of the Numeracy Committee:

1) To support teachers in their professional development to foster a positive mathematics culture.

Goals of the Numeracy Committee:

2) To improve students' ability to understand and communicate mathematical skills and concepts.

What is Numeracy?

Numeracy is defined by the B.C. Ministry of Education as ...

"the ability, willingness and perseverance to interpret and apply mathematical understanding to solve problems in contextualized situations, and to analyze and communicate these solutions in ways relevant to the given context."

** Numeracy and Literacy are pillars of the curriculum ** We are ALL Numeracy and Literacy teachers.

- promote a Growth Mindset with our students to celebrate learning - including mistakes
- create opportunities for students to explore their own Mathematical interests & passions

(ie. a Science Fair with a Mathematical focus; coding & robotics)

 enhance experiential learning and infuse more Indigenous culture into Mathematics (ie. weaving to enhance pattern recognition and application)

- further promote the Core Competencies from the new BC education curriculum to enhance our Mathematical vision:
- Communication, Critical Thinking, Creative Thinking, Positive Personal & Cultural Identity, Personal Awareness and Responsibility, and Social Responsibility
- better communicate our role as a numeracy committee with School District 46 (we created a district newsletter last fall)

- facilitate "expert" Math instructors from around B.C., who are well-versed in the new education curriculum, to provide engaging in-service training at the Primary, Intermediate & Secondary levels
- Promote Math CAMPS = Collaborating About Mathematics
- Sessions with presenters Sandra Ball (Primary), Selina Miller (Intermediate), and Marc Garneau (Secondary)
- Take on leadership roles at our schools and promote Professional Development opportunities like the Jan 6 Numeracy session on *Box Cars and One-Eyed Jacks.* Our MPES team attended together.

What can you do as engaged parents and district representatives?

- Talk to your child about their current experiences in Math
- Encourage them to remain positive/resilient and brainstorm ways to support them if they are struggling
- Stay in contact with your child's teacher(s) and ask them how you can be supportive at home
- Promote numeracy with your PAC's, DPAC's, Committees etc.
- Practice and review basic skills at the Elementary level
 (ie. doubles, doubles +/- 1, make it 10, skip counting & times tables,
- Play math games (ie. 21, Crib, Snap, Draw etc.)

To become a mathematical problem solver...

 we cannot just think in a linear manner and memorize the algorithm/formula/steps. There are many ways to get to the correct answer, and there may be more than one possible answer, so we must provide multiple opportunities for students to experiment, discuss, collaborate and demonstrate their learning process

Each school gets \$50/1.0 FTE for School PD Committee Initiatives.

THE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT LENS


At the centre of the lens are teachers and their learning, both as a collective and as individuals. The term "teachers' professional development" is used to highlight its use both in thinking about individual PD and PD as a collective endeavor.

The Inner Ring: Key criteria

The inner ring consists of three factors that are necessary for an activity to be considered professional development. If any of the three are not present, then the activity should not be seen as professional development.

The Outer Ring: Necessary factors

The factors in the outer ring are critical to the success of teacher-directed professional development as a collective endeavor. In turn, this collective work provides the necessary conditions for all teachers to be able to create their own rich tapestries of appropriate professional learning.


