TRANSPORTATION REVIEW

TRANSPORTATION OPTION 1: STATUS QUO

- Option 1: Continue with status quo
 - No changes to service
 - Changes required to regulation in order to align with current service
 - Courtesy riders currently impact service to eligible riders, counter to regulation
 - 1158 registered riders as of Feb 22, 2021
 - 906 eligible riders
 - 262 courtesy riders
 - Note: some "eligible" riders may also have a "courtesy" route





TRANSPORTATION OPTION 2: IN CATCHMENT ONLY

- Option 2: In-catchment only / No CSF
 - Providing service only to eligible riders (those students residing inside their catchment and outside of the walk area)
 - Reduces overall number of routes required, redirecting money to other service areas

SCHOOL

- Enhances safety by reducing need for transfer points
- Net savings would be partially offset by loss of CSF transportation revenue



TRANSPORTATION OPTION 3: IMPROVED SERVICE TO ELIGIBLE

SCHOOL

- Option 3: Improve services for eligible riders
 - Improving service levels to eligible riders, including average ride time and morning/afternoon wait times
 - Bell schedule adjustments limited to <15 minutes from current
 - Continue to provide service to courtesy riders, where space permits, however level of service (overall ride time, etc) may be impacted
 - Would cost more and/or reduce service levels to courtesy riders



TRANSPORTATION OPTION 4: IMPROVEMENTS FOR ALL

- Option 4: Overall Improvements, at a cost
 - Improvements to all service levels, including courtesy students
 - Bell schedule changes < 15 minutes
 - Consideration of walk limits
 - Note: Walk limits don't imply unsupervised travel
 - Differentiation of Primary vs. Intermediate
 - Would require increase to overall transportation budget
 - Some riders may still be negatively impacted
